We are an NGO for development cooperation, humanitarian action, emergencies and education, with 30 years of experience in promoting comprehensive health and pharmaceutical aid to vulnerable communities. What sets us apart is that we are the first non-profit organisation in Spain to specialise in supplying basic medicines and medical supplies for health programmes and emergency care.

The global COVID-19 pandemic laid bare just how important health is, particularly in the most fragile and vulnerable contexts where the greatest inequality is experienced. Prevention through primary care, infectious disease surveillance and investment in public health policies are central to bolstering health care systems and responding to these situations.

In 2022, we have continued our work in Latin America and Africa to promote comprehensive health interventions, which the pandemic had shifted into a second-tier priority. We have focused on primary health care, access to and rational use of medicines, pharmacovigilance and disease control as the cornerstones of our work. Likewise, we also have focused efforts on food and nutrition security, promoting sexual and reproductive health, as well as on other determinants of health including violence against women and the quality and availability of water, with a cross-cutting approach in human rights, gender equality and respect for the environment.

Ukraine, the focus of humanitarian action

The humanitarian crisis in Ukraine following the Russian invasion has caused millions of innocent civilian casualties and severe damage to infrastructure. Nearly half of the country's population, some 15 million people, have been forced to flee their homes to protect their lives, facing tremendous uncertainty about what the future holds and how their physical and mental health will be impacted. This has been Farmamundi's main humanitarian focus in 2022. We have been administering medicines and medical

supplies since even before the war and so were able to respond quickly with direct action in the country, working hand in hand with local Ukrainian organisations to help meet the population's basic needs for food and physical and mental health care, guaranteeing safe spaces for women and minors who are victims of the conflict and experiencing internal displacement.

At Farmamundi we work to make the world a fairer, more equitable place, so that access to health care doesn't depend on someone's country of birth or the colour of their skin or their religion. **We have managed to reach 4.5 million people this year, 3.5 million of whom are refugees and returnees from the war in Ukraine.**

All these efforts have been made possible thanks to the Farmamundi team, the technical staff in Spain and at our international offices, as well as local partner organisations in the countries we work in and who support us daily. **We are particularly grateful to our entire membership base of partners and partner organisations for their resolute involvement year in and year out, making the work we do possible and helping to make this world a fairer and healthier place.**

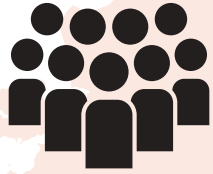

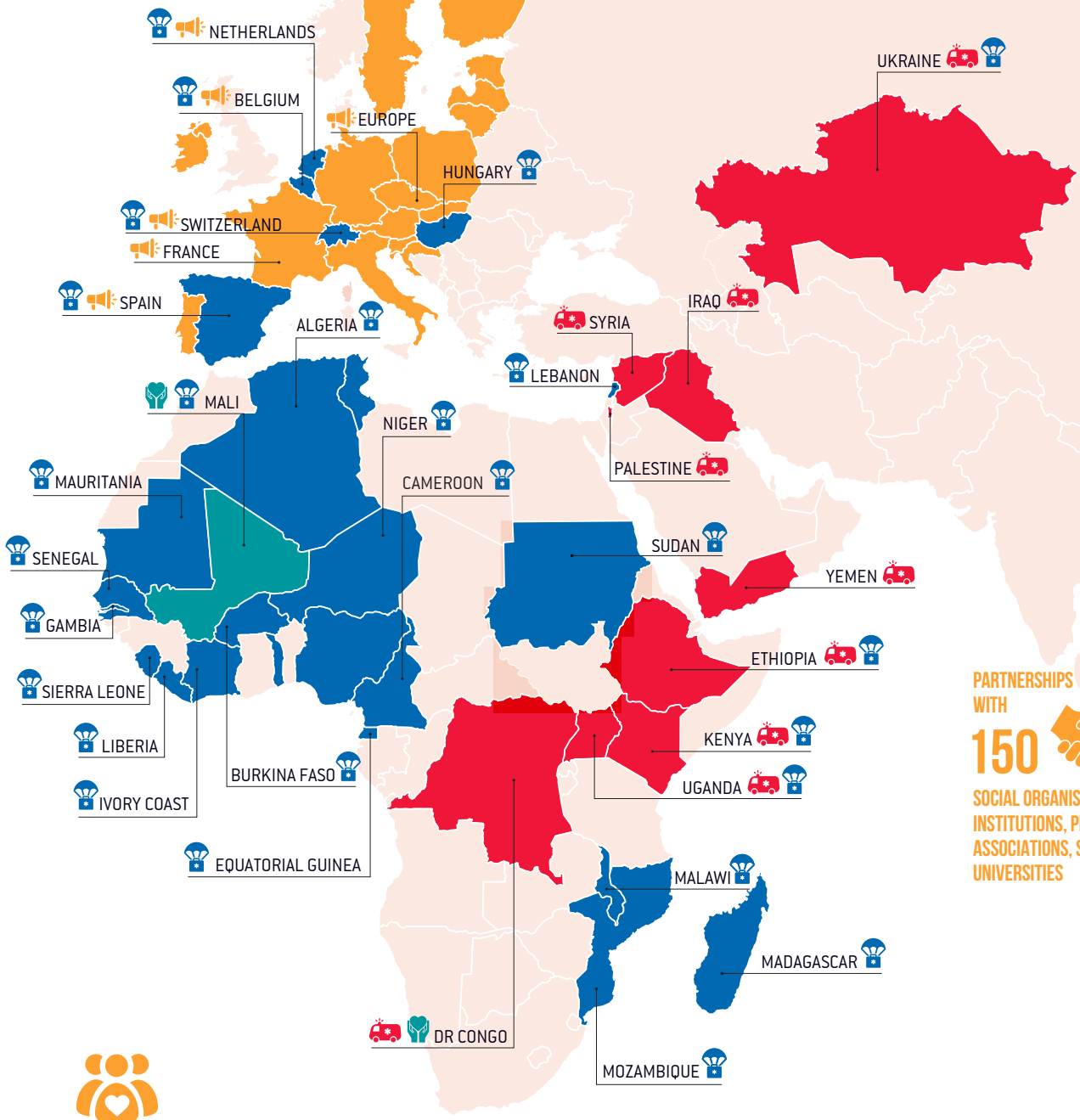

MOVING PAST THE PANDEMIC AND STANDING IN SOLIDARITY WITH UKRAINE

The end of the pandemic, first in Europe and then in the countries in Latin America, Africa and Asia where Farmamundi works, has made it possible for us to continue our work promoting health from a holistic perspective. The pandemic showed us just how fragile health systems are when faced with global threats like COVID-19 and underscored the need to strengthen these systems' prevention, monitoring and infectious disease surveillance tools to enhance their sustainability, efficiency and effectiveness.

Following the Russian invasion of Ukraine in February 2022, Farmamundi have launched humanitarian efforts in coordination with the government of Spain, the European Union and the Ministry of Health of Ukraine through the Ukrainian Embassy in Spain, to ensure that the right donations of medicines and effective humanitarian aid are provided. Spanish citizens have once again demonstrated their solidarity with a nation that has been unjustly attacked by contributing funds and donations and welcoming Ukrainian refugees into Spain.

Thanks to the support of both public and private organisations and individual donors, Farmamundi has managed to mobilise nearly €5 million for Ukraine, transforming it into 80 tonnes of medicines and health supplies, basic necessities kits, safe temporary shelters and psychological and social support, reaching 3.5 million people affected by the conflict, mainly women and minors.

110 comprehensive health projects and initiatives up and running

We've carried out **43 humanitarian action interventions** in countries in challenging situations like Ethiopia, Uganda, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Haiti, Yemen, Palestine and Iraq. We've also implemented **67 cooperation projects for health development** through our seven international offices in Central America, South America and Sub-Saharan Africa.

Additionally, we have launched some **60 educational projects** through partnerships with 90 schools, universities and other organisations in practically every Spanish autonomous community, thanks to the support of Farmamundi's eight regional offices.

Our **Humanitarian Logistics department** has sent health kits, medicines and medical supplies to Ukraine, and we have also made large shipments of humanitarian aid to destinations as challenging and in need as Syria, Lebanon and the Sahrawi refugee camps. In total, we've shipped 110 tonnes of medicines and medical supplies in 304 shipments to 33 countries.

We remain committed to quality as the hallmark of Farmamundi, evidenced by the comprehensive quality system that has been in place since 2020 as a way of further developing a culture of continuous improvement that facilitates team management, motivation and commitment, and maximises the efficiency, effectiveness, impact and sustainability of our operational processes.

The technical team, volunteers and partner organisations in the countries where we work have demonstrated their outstanding degree of commitment and professionalism, improving the quality of life and health of those who need it most. This would not have been possible without the unconditional support of our entire membership base and the pharmaceutical sector, as well as the public and private donors who have once again placed their trust in Farmamundi to continue advancing health as a universal right.

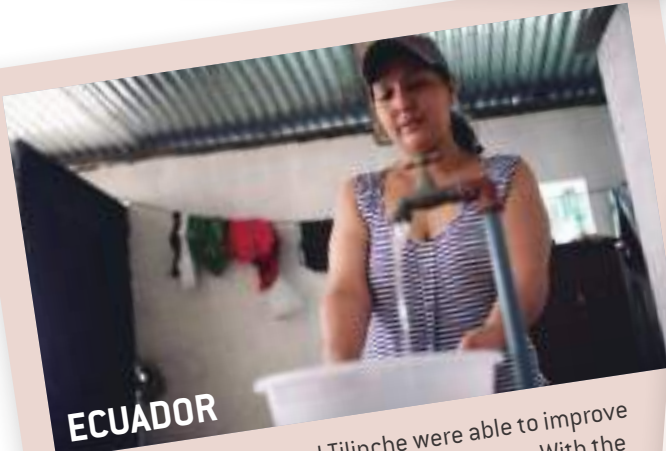
MALI

Together with local partners, we have raised public awareness in the Kita Nord and Boudofo communes about using condoms to prevent sexually transmitted diseases and unwanted pregnancies. We also put on plays to inform the public about prenatal care and harmful traditional practices.



SPAIN

We participated in the 'Cooperarium' Biennial of Cooperation and Human Rights in Valencia, an event where we had the opportunity to share with the public how we work, to learn about the reality of people displaced by armed conflict, climate change, natural disasters and to raise awareness about existing inequalities in health and education.



ECUADOR

Families in El Palmar and Tilinche were able to improve their quality of life thanks to access to water. With the support of Zaragoza City Council, we have helped build a new drinking water plant, setting up a system to supply water to community homes.



KENYA

Under the framework of the "Afya Zaidi" project, which means 'more health' in Swahili, we are working to improve the health centre in Kasarani and its ties with local educational and health programmes. Data is analysed for evidence-based improvements (information systems, infectious disease surveillance and health education).



SPAIN

With the war in Ukraine raging in the background and still in the midst of the pandemic, we attended the Infarma conferences in Madrid, the National Pharmaceutical Conference and the International Conference, both in Seville, where we explained the management of medical supplies in emergencies, as well as how important it is to make the right donations.



UKRAINE

In partnership with Médecins du Monde, we helped provide medicines to hospitals and health centres in Ukraine, as well as provide mental health care and care for people with chronic illnesses who need treatment. A total of 79 kits were sent to hospitals in the country (39,531 kg).



PERU

We have supported reducing child malnutrition and anaemia in municipalities and rural Andean communities with an indigenous population where more than 30% of children suffer from chronic malnutrition. The initiatives bolster care capacities in health centres and schools.



SPAIN

We organised a charity concert together with the Paterna City Council and the Ukrainian Consulate in the Valencian Community. The ICHBIN Ensemble, led by mezzo-soprano María Rumyantseva and conductor Pedro Grau, raised €18,975 with their music, which was used to help with health care for the people of Odessa.



IRAQ

Working together with local partner Heevie, we have implemented initiatives to provide primary health care, sexual and reproductive health services and mental health and psychosocial support. We also have provided medicines and promote community health to the internally displaced population in Cham Mishko and in the return area of Bouzan.



UGANDA

We held an event in Kyaka II to strengthen the skills of community health promoters in promoting sexual and reproductive rights and the prevention of violence. Deeply rooted in the health system in Uganda, they are members of the refugee population who are responsible for primary health care.



DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

Socio-health attention for the population affected by Hurricane Fiona in the provinces of La Altagracia, El Seibo, La Romana and Hato Mayor. We have prioritised giving out hygiene kits, nutritional kits and drinking water to more than 1,500 people. Mosquito nets were also provided to prevent diseases such as dengue, malaria and chikungunya.



NICARAGUA

Despite the critical political and social situation of the Nicaraguan people, the strategy to improve nutritional health, basic health and access to water and sanitation is being maintained to counteract the setback that the COVID-19 pandemic has caused in the most vulnerable communities on the Caribbean coast.



FOCUS ON THE 2030 AGENDA THAT PRIORITISES GLOBAL JUSTICE

The uncertainties and threats inherent in the globalised world in which we live, where the progress made in the 2030 Agenda—zero hunger, maternal health, gender equality, etc.—seems to vanish in the face of inequality, poverty, global warming, authoritarianism and, now, global wars and their effects, compel social organisations like ours to bring the focus back to an Agenda which, now more than ever, must achieve greater levels of global justice.

Because while the field of human rights is shrinking and governments' responses are proving to be ineffective, our challenge is to achieve a truly committed international community that rejects authoritarian responses, recovers solidarity as the axis of its policies, and ultimately places people and the ecosystem at the heart of all its international cooperation efforts.

Our efforts in 2022 have been guided by this vision, promoting 67 international cooperation initiatives through which we've supported primary health care systems, the restitution of rights of women and girls who are survivors of gender-based violence and the work of women human rights defenders. We have also strengthened food security and access to sanitation and drinking water for thousands of people in Latin America and sub-Saharan Africa.

None of this would have been possible without the support of institutions and donors, the help of our local partners and the commitment of the association and its professional and volunteer team. Again this year, we have managed to continue channelling the aspirations of a committed citizenry, mindful that it's always the people who lose in war.

Medical, psychological and social care for women and girls who are victims of sexual violence

The comprehensive recovery and restoration of the rights of women and girls who are survivors of sexual violence in

North-Kivu has been one of the priorities of the initiatives that we implement together with FEPSI in the DRC.



To this end, we have raised community awareness and strengthened the capacities of six health units for sexual and reproductive health and HIV-AIDS care, ensuring medical, psychological and social care for 474 women and girls who are victims of sexual violence, as well as counselling and access to family planning methods for 2,325 women.

Also noteworthy are the 6,779 HIV diagnostic tests conducted and the detection of 391 new positive cases (70% women), as well as the specialised treatment of 2,867 people living with HIV (68% women). Finally, support has been provided to local women's organisations, promoting the development of sustainable economic initiatives and their leadership in protecting local ecosystems.

Sebastiana Vasquez Pisquii is a member of the Women’s Commission in her community. She has come to the inauguration of the Demonstrative Controlled Landfill and says that *“before there was only rubbish on the side of the streets, bags, nappies, whatever... people had nowhere to throw their waste to prevent disease and contamination”*.

Now she speaks proudly while showing off the sanitary landfill, the only one to date in a rural community in the municipality. She looks at her grandchildren and says, *“it’s important to show it to them... we have to think about them... and teach them about values so that when the time comes, they will sort their waste, not just throw it wherever... and live a better life”*.

The Utz Qawach, *Kujb’in che uriqik le utz K’aslemal (We’re Doing Fine. Moving Towards the Good Life)* agreement, which we developed together with ASECSA, Pies de Occidente, UAM and SER, benefits families in 52 communities in Santa Lucía Utatlán.



Disease smart units in El Salvador

In 2022, the work with El Salvador’s Ministry of Health was strengthened after signing a three-year partnership agreement to support the right to health in three major areas of institutional work: equitable and coordinated infectious disease prevention and surveillance; management, quality and rational use of medicines to improve the attention of vulnerable groups; and prevention of teenage pregnancy and gender-based violence.

This joint commitment with the local NGO Asociación Salvadoreña Promotora de la Salud also takes shape with the creation of eight disease intelligence units, the strengthening of capacities at the national level, the launch of several studies and the development of strategies for promoting health and preventive care, as well as the proper use of medicines with a focus on shared responsibility.



UKRAINE, THE EPICENTRE OF HUMANITARIAN ACTION

The war in Ukraine has pushed the number of displaced people worldwide to 100 million in 2022, up from 90 million in 2021. The effects of this war alongside existing (and forgotten) conflicts and the climate crisis have left more than 222 million people in a situation of food insecurity. Moreover, public health in the countries where we work is severely compromised by COVID-19, high rates of gender-based violence, mpox, as well as outbreaks of Ebola and cholera that are re-emerging in some countries where these diseases were thought to have been eradicated.

Working alongside our local partners, this year we have continued to identify the most critical humanitarian needs, plan responses, set budgets and request the required support from public and private organisations to address the crises in Syria, Yemen, Ukraine, Ethiopia, Kenya, Iraq, Uganda and the Democratic Republic of Congo, the latter on the brink of armed conflict and famine. In all, we have implemented a response plan in 52 humanitarian action projects to prioritise the most vulnerable people affected by the crises. Specifically, we have targeted households led by women, minors, the elderly and people with disabilities, and we always strive not to ignore the “forgotten” crises compared to those that are in the media spotlight.

At Farmamundi, we are grateful for the trust and generosity of our public and private funders, because our work wouldn't be possible without them.



Reinforcing women's sexual and reproductive health in the DRC

Together with local partners PPSSP, FEPSI, CFJ and GADHOP, we are working to enhance the capacities of the local health system and improve the living conditions of the most vulnerable. We are committed to an integrated health care strategy that involves several levels of action to improve sexual and reproductive health care and to address sexual and gender-based violence in a context marked by forced displacement and recurrent epidemics.

The Democratic Republic of the Congo is embroiled in one of the most complicated and challenging humanitarian situations in the world, with 26.4 million people in urgent need. With numerous active conflicts and severe food insecurity, particularly in the eastern part of the country, this is a situation that has major repercussions on the civilian population, which suffers from systematic human rights abuses and violations that require coordinated and efficient responses.

EMERGENCIES

Valentyna Moskovchenko is a psychologist, psychotherapist and PhD in psychology from Kharkiv, Ukraine.

The war caught up with her family in Kharkiv and they were forced to move to Poltava. *“I have two children, a husband and pets. We all left. We found a children’s programme in Poltava run by the office in coordination with Farmamundi, and my children and I participated and had a wonderful time”,* says Valentyna.

This Ukrainian psychologist explains that she felt the need to help people and wanted to do it by doing what she does best, providing psychological care. *“I was hired to work in the gender office. I’ve been working here for four months, creating and organising training programmes for staff and children. I provide psychological support to women with children who now live in our shelters. The main problems I have to deal with are the fears and anxiety that the children and their families have. Parents also have problems like being worried about their kids, the loss of their homes, the feeling of insecurity, ties to family and friends. We all need psychological support right now, there is so much work to be done, so we will continue to offer our help to the people affected by this terrible war”,* concludes Moskovchenko.

Ethiopia: ensuring food and nutrition security

Ethiopia is dealing with the cumulative impact of two years of armed conflict, the massive displacement of 4.5 million people and drought following the sixth consecutive season of low rainfall. We have been implementing health interventions in the neighbouring regions of Tigray, Amhara and Afar since 2021.

The work is coordinated with local partners Women Empowerment Action (WE-Action), Africa Humanitarian Action Ethiopia (AHA) and Association for Women’s Sanctuary and Development (AWSAD) to help ease the suffering of the displaced, returnee and local population. We implement measures to strengthen the public health system, with a strong focus on sexual and reproductive health and mental health. We also promote food security and nutrition, providing basic economic support to women and girls who have survived sexual and gender-based violence to empower their autonomy.





SUPPLYING MEDICINES TO HOSPITALS IN UKRAINE, A CHALLENGE FOR HUMANITARIAN RESPONSE

This past 2022 was clearly marked by the Russian invasion of Ukraine and the subsequent humanitarian crisis. Since the start of the fighting, our humanitarian logistics department has delivered more than 79,000 kilograms of medicines and medical supplies to the country in 130 shipments. We have worked closely with the Ukrainian embassy in Spain and the consulates in Barcelona and Valencia over the last few months to guarantee that supplies are delivered to the hospitals in Dnipro, Odessa and Lviv.

But the escalation of war in Eastern Europe has not been our only focus of attention. Responding to the ever-delicate situation of the Sahrawi camps in Algeria, the fire in the fuel depots in the Cuban city of Matanzas and the needs in African countries such as Senegal, Sudan and Niger have been some of our most important work

this year. We have sent more than 110 tonnes of pharmaceutical products to 33 countries on three continents over the past twelve months.

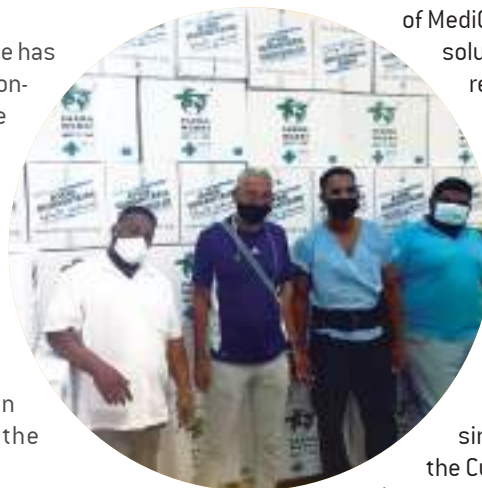
We also received the HPC (Humanitarian Procurement Centres) Charter renewal audit issued by the European Directorate for Civil Protection and Humanitarian Aid Operations (DG ECHO) in late 2022. We also renewed our customs warehouse certification from the València Foreign Health Service and the Spanish Agency for Medicines and Medical Devices.

Medicines to treat people affected by the fire in Cuba

As suppliers for the Spanish Agency for International Development Cooperation (AECID for its acronym in Spanish), we supplied medicines and medical supplies to treat people suffering from burns after the devastating fire that broke out in August at a fuel base in Matanzas. Thanks to the collaboration of MediCuba, we were also able to send solutions for water and electrolyte replacement, systemic antibiotics, analgesics, anti-inflammatories and antibiotic ointments for topical use on burns. Two people lost their lives in the fire, 14 firefighters went missing and more than 4,000 people were displaced.

MediCuba España ONGD has been active in the field of cooperation since 1998 and works together with the Cuban Ministry of Public Health (MINSAP for its acronym in Spanish) and provincial and municipal authorities, particularly in the provinces of Santiago de Cuba and Guantánamo.

Cuba suffers from a general shortage of supplies due to the US blockade of the country's economy and development, which hinders governmental and local entities from running properly, according to Carlos M. Escribano Arenas, Medicuba's secretary and treasurer.

OPEN ARMS RESCUES, HEALTH CARE AND HOPE IN THE MEDITERRANEAN

“The people we rescue suffer from varying degrees of dehydration, hypothermia, malnutrition, exhaustion, trauma, shock and traumatic stress, exanthematous diseases, chemical burns... caused by the tough sea crossing, but also due to the inhumane conditions they experienced in the detention camps in Libya and on the journey from their countries of origin. The vast majority of the women are victims of sexual abuse, and some are pregnant”, says Open Arms’ medical coordinator, Juanfe Jiménez.

In 2015, Open Arms joined the fleet of humanitarian organisations whose core mission is to protect life at sea in international waters, where governments are failing to do the job. *“We work in international waters in the Central Mediterranean where we rescue people who are at risk of*

capsizing and are trying to reach Europe”, Jiménez continues.

Thanks to their intervention, thousands of people in mortal danger finally reach a safe harbour. These are men, women and children of all ages, some of them newborns. *“Farmamundi helps us to supply medical material in a centralised way, with a wide range of products that enables us to cover our needs quickly and efficiently”,* concludes Jiménez.

NETWORKED EDUCATION FOR THE RIGHT TO GLOBAL HEALTH

2022 has proved to be an exciting year in terms of our mission as an organisation. Working together with our teams of volunteers, specialists, collaborators, groups, organisations and institutions, we have managed to reach over 150,000 people directly through our education projects for social transformation. We have implemented activities in 12 autonomous communities, working in a network with more than 90 schools, universities and organisations, achieving what we believe to be the most significant result in our entire history as an organisation.

Global health is still on the political and media agenda and, perhaps more so than ever, the right to health is very much at the forefront of the public's mind. A growing number of people want to be part of the global movement for human rights. We have actively participated in community health promotion processes in 11 Spanish provinces over the last year, linking up with mobilisation campaigns and initiatives that promote global health based on equity and under the framework of the Sustainable Development Goals and the 2030 Agenda. In terms of formal education, Farmamundi works in more than 60 schools throughout the country, supporting and helping all educational communities that demonstrate their commitment to health and human rights on a daily basis.

Community-based strategies to break down barriers to health services

Through participatory research with students and health professionals in Madrid, we discovered that many people recognise barriers to accessing health services and basic medicines but lack the specific training to tackle them.



Thus, the 'Activando Salud: articulando redes de salud comunitaria [Activating Health: building community health networks]' initiative, funded by the Madrid City Council, developed a practical and hands-on training programme on asset-based community health rooted in learning and service, which allowed students and professionals to dialogue with people in vulnerable situations and together identify elements and resources that promote and sustain their community health in four Madrid neighbourhoods. This community health outreach initiative has been rolled out in schools in 11 other provinces.

“NOW THAT WE’VE HAD THE SURGERY, WE CAN BE A ROLE MODEL FOR OTHER WOMEN”

“Aminata knew that I was mutilated and explained to me what reconstruction was and what the process she had gone through was like. I felt safe with her and, after going to the hospital, I am now waiting for them to give me an appointment. I’m really looking forward to it”, says Hawa, one of the more than 30 women survivors of female genital mutilation who have passed through the Referral Unit for Reconstructive Surgery at the Hospital Universitario Doctor Peset in 2022, a centre we work with together with Red Aminata in an initiative financed by the Regional Government of Valencia.

“Now that we’ve had the surgery, we can be a role model for other women. It’s really important that other women learn about the operation because it will change their lives and they will be able to enjoy their sexuality. This operation improves many aspects of their health. The future will also be better for our girls”, Aicha, another of the women who has passed through the unit, emotionally concludes.



The first network of communication for social transformation in Aragón is born

Care work involves a multitude of activities and services, both paid or unpaid, like cleaning, cooking or cleaning up after a dependent person, tasks which are essential for sustaining a person’s life and health. This work is mostly done by women in precarious situations, with negative consequences for their physical, mental, emotional and social health.

If the world’s women continue to carry the burden of care, dignifying this work and making it a responsibility that we share as

organisations, institutions and society, must be an essential step towards guaranteeing gender equality in terms of health. Thus, the documentary *‘El peso sobre mí (The Weight I Carry)’*, with Erabide Emakume Elkarte in the Basque Country, and the cyber-activist campaign *#SinSaludNoHayCuidados (Without Health There Is No Care)*, with AIPHYC in Valencia, have gathered the voices of female domestic and care workers to demand that this debate be placed at the forefront of our society, and consequently defending their right to health.

TRANSPARENCY

Transparency is one of Farmamundi's core principles, the cornerstone for building trust with donors, partners and everyone who participates in our projects.

Farmamundi strives to ensure the organisation's financial stability and economic sustainability. To this end, it takes a forward-looking approach to planning, fostering a culture of optimisation and efficiency in managing available resources, with an extremely high level of commitment and demand.

With this aim in mind, we are implementing a quality control system that ensures the transparency, traceability, effectiveness and efficiency of our processes.

91% allocated to the mission

While 2020 and 2021 were marked by our humanitarian efforts with regard to the COVID-19 pandemic, in 2022 we focused on providing a humanitarian response to the victims of the armed conflict in Ukraine, allocating €4.7 million to support more than 3.5 million people by sending medicines and medical supplies, as well as providing direct humanitarian aid in the country, in collaboration with local partners.

We have managed €16,677,914 in 2022, a 22% year-on-year increase, to implement the organisation's projects and activities, with an increase in public funding (65%) compared to private funding (35%), with a profit of €27,692.20. We continue to allocate 91% of our funds to our mission, so that we can reach the maximum number of people and improve the health of those who need it most.

We are working to make the right to health a truly universal right, involving public and private organisations in this vision, as well as increasing our membership base. The full audit report can be consulted on our website: farmamundi.org

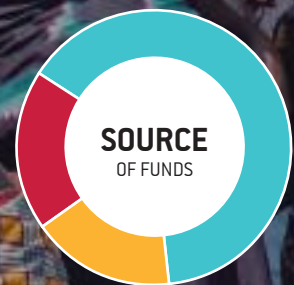

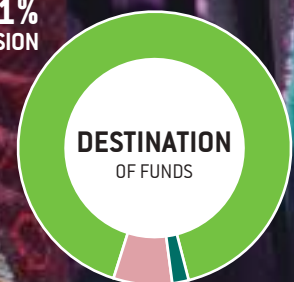

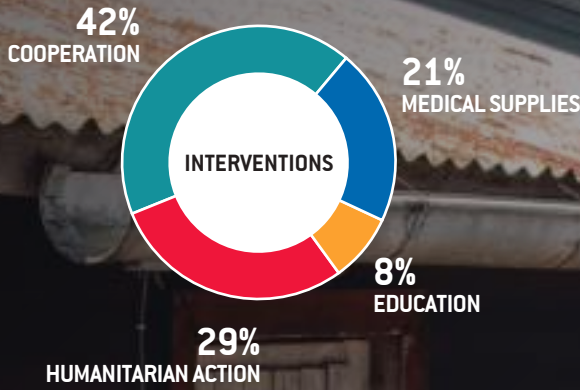
