We are an NGO for development cooperation, humanitarian action, emergencies and education, with 31 years of experience promoting comprehensive health and providing pharmaceutical aid to vulnerable communities. What sets us apart is that we are the first non-profit organisation in Spain to specialise in supplying basic medicines and medical supplies for health programmes and emergency care.

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ear 2024 has put us to the test. The DANA weather event (cold drop) that hit Valencia was a stark reminder that emergencies know no borders. This time, we experienced the effects of a climate-related disaster first-hand, right on our doorstep. We were there from the start, thanks to the solidarity shown by pharmacies, professionals, volunteers and committed organisations, a true reflection of what it means to cooperate: being where we're needed most, with speed, compassion and professionalism.

I had the opportunity to be there in the first few days following the disaster and witnessed the severity of the situation up close: flooded streets, overwhelmed health centres and families who had lost everything. But I also witnessed something even more powerful: a community determined to rise, to help, and to leave no one behind. We immediately activated our Humanitarian Logistics Unit, distributing over 13,000 kg of medical supplies with a focus on care homes and health centres. We supported women in vulnerable situations, volunteer platforms and medical brigades. More than 40 volunteers joined this collective effort. The rebuilding process is under way, but what endures—and continues to inspire us—is the solidarity that held strong, even in the most difficult moments.

That same spirit of solidarity drives us to keep working in other parts of the world facing severe humanitarian crises, in Palestine, Ethiopia, Ukraine, Yemen and the Democratic Republic of the Congo, where Farmamundi continues to stand with those affected by protracted conflict, overlooked health emergencies and daily violations of their most basic rights. There, as here, we always put people first.

It has also been a year of meaningful encounters and recognitions that have moved us deeply. I participated

in the presentation of the documentary "Las que sobrevivimos" (Those of Us Who Survive) in Bilbao, where we gave voice and visibility to women fighting tirelessly to reclaim their dignity after experiencing sexual violence. We welcomed representatives from the Official Colleges of Pharmacists to our headquarters in Valencia, strengthening the ties between our work and the pharmacy sector's commitment. And in Madrid, I had the honour of receiving an award from the College of Pharmacists, a distinction that goes beyond the personal and stands as a collective tribute to the role of women in international cooperation and to the entire Farmamundi team who make our work possible.

Every action, every project, every shared story confirms that we are on the right path. A path made possible thanks to the steadfast commitment of our members, the institutions that support us, and everyone who believes, as we do, that health must be a universal right.

Thank you for walking this path with us.



# SOLIDARITY IN TIMES OF CRISIS AND EMERGENCY



e are living in a world marked by multiple, complex crises: armed conflict, the worsening climate emergency, rising humanitarian needs, and widespread cuts to human rights and international aid. At Farmamundi, we continue to call for greater political and social commitment to reverse this trend and to protect people and the planet from inequality, poverty and environmental degradation.

One of the most serious situations is the humanitarian crisis in Gaza, where we are witnessing with growing helplessness the destruction of a defenceless civilian population, while the international community fails to halt the violence or ensure the delivery of urgently needed humanitarian aid to save lives. Farmamundi succeeded in delivering two shipments of medical supplies in coordination with the European Union, the World Health Organization and the NGO Mundubat.

The DANA weather event (cold drop) in Valencia also reminded us that emergencies transcend borders. Once again, solidarity came from across the Spanish pharmaceutical sector, as well as from individuals and organisations in many different fields who mobilised quickly and placed their trust in Farmamundi to support those affected and contribute to their recovery.

#### Over 170 health initiatives

Globally, Farmamundi carried out 176 projects in international development cooperation, humanitarian action, and education, improving the health and quality of life of 2,090,335 people, more than half of them women and girls.

These initiatives have strengthened public health systems by improving care services, supporting preventive action and epidemiological monitoring. They have also helped restore the rights of women facing violence, supported human rights defenders in their work for the common good, and ensured food and nutrition security and access to clean water and sanitation for thousands of people across Latin America, Asia and Africa.

We have also implemented interventions to alleviate suffering, protect fundamental rights, and defend the dignity of thousands of families. We continued our support for people affected by conflict in Ukraine, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Yemen, Gaza, Sudan, and Syria, humanitarian crises ranked among the most severe in the world by the United Nations. At the same time, we continued our work with internally displaced people, returnees, and refugees in Kenya, Uganda and Ethiopia.

#### **Humanitarian supplies to 35 countries**

Through our Humanitarian Logistics Unit, we managed 244 humanitarian shipments to 35 countries, including essential medicines and medical supplies (a total of 119 tonnes) reaching some of the world's most challenging contexts, such as Syria and Gaza.

We continue to demand greater political and social commitment to protect people and the planet from inequality, poverty, and environmental degradation

In the field of education, we reached over 150,000 participants and collaborators across more than 60 educational communities, spanning universities, vocational training centres, secondary schools, and primary education.

All of this has been made possible thanks to the dedication and professionalism of our technical team, the ongoing guidance of our Governing Board, and the unwavering support of our donors and members, who make our mission possible each and every day.

Chronic malnutrition affects 48% of Indigenous children, and 30% of the population has no access to safe water. Together with AECID, we support food security, water, and gender initiatives to help communities defend their rights.



Two awards! The Royal Academy of Pharmacy of Galicia recognised our work with the 4th Perfecto Feijóo Award. The University of Santiago de Compostela also honoured the project 'Community Health: social and educational mapping from an urban feminism approach'.



Through the Nosotras (Us) initiative, we marked five years of continuous efforts to restore women's right to a life free from violence and to improve their economic autonomy, in partnership with APROCSAL, FUNSALPRODESE, and AECID.



In response to the ongoing emergency, we prioritised food assistance and distributed hygiene kits to more than 5,000 refugees in the Nur Shams camp in the West Bank, with support from the Xunta de Galicia and the Emergency Fund.



We launched the awareness and fundraising campaign Tu latido + solidario (Your Heartbeat in Solidarity) in pharmacies across Spain, selling heart-shaped gummy sweets in partnership with Trolli Ibérica.

Now available in Farmamundi's solidarity shop! We support the economic autonomy of refugee women in Kenya by improving their future prospects through a line of handmade products, including scrunchies and bracelets.



We premiered Las que sobrevivimos (Those of Us Who Survived), a documentary portraying the experiences of six Congolese women who fled war and sexual violence in their country and are now trying to rebuild their lives. Directed by Itxaso Díaz, it has been screened at 36 festivals and has picked up 11 awards.



In the rural areas of Chuquisaca, ten farming communities in Poroma are overcoming long-standing barriers to healthcare through the Intercultural and Community Family Health model, in partnership with the Tomás Katari Polytechnic Institute and the Government of Aragón.



Since the beginning of the war, we have launched over 20 projects to support the population, focusing on direct aid through cash transfers and vouchers, mental health services, safe spaces for children, and job opportunities for women.



Indiscriminate bombing in southern Lebanon, triggered by the escalation of the war in Gaza, forced many families to flee their homes. We prioritised support with food, medicines, shelter, and both medical and psychological care.



Success of the solidarity concert A todo jazz por la salud infantil (All That Jazz for Children's Health). Four hundred people filled the Rodrigo Hall at the Palau de la Música in Valencia to support Farmamundi and enjoy the music of Sedajazz and Sole Giménez.



e write this report mindful of the growing wave of reactionary rhetoric that questions the 2030 Agenda, ignores its contribution to improving the quality of life of millions of people around the world, and above all, undermines the principles and values of social justice, equality, peace, human dignity, and solidarity that give meaning to life in society. It is no exaggeration to say that democracy itself and the very concept of human rights are at risk, under attack by a powerful elite that promotes inequality, impoverishment, the erosion of rights, climate denial, war, and authoritarianism.

In the face of this reality, we must act. We must demand a committed form of multilateralism that puts people first, protects life, safeguards the planet, and ensures international relations based on peace and cooperation.

Our cooperation work in 2024 has been aligned with that mission. The 69 actions we carried out have improved care services and public health systems through preventive work and epidemiological monitoring. They have restored the

> rights of women facing violence, supported women human rights defenders in their efforts for the common good, and helped guarantee food and nutritional security and access to safe water and sanitation for thousands of people in Latin America and Africa.

This has only been possible thanks to the support of our partners and allies, the commitment of the association and its professional team, and the trust placed in us by institutions and donors, allowing us, once again, to be a meaningful channel for civic aspirations and to fulfil the mission entrusted to Farmamundi.

#### YOUNG PEOPLE DRIVING **CHANGE IN MALI**

In 2024, we continued working alongside teenagers from rural communities in Mali so they can exercise their sexual and reproductive rights and lead action against climate change.

We strengthened primary health care by introducing age-appropriate, specialised services.

> The educational community also joined

> > in, helping to prevent sexism and improve school infrastructure with a focus on menstrual health.

We also supported youth leaders in organising and empowering themselves to defend the right to live free from violence and in

a sustainable environment. Their commitment translates into real action, such as community reforestation, which is already helping to build resilience to global warming. All of these actions were made possible with the support of IAMANEH and ASIC-Jigiya Blon.

More than 3,000 teenagers received guidance to help prevent sexual violence.

778 teachers were trained in Comprehensive Sex Education, reaching over 2,300 students. More than 1,200 mothers and fathers took part in workshops on preventing violence against children.

These are just a few of the most visible impacts of the Por Nuestros Derechos (For Our Rights) programme, an ini-

tiative aimed at improving access to healthcare, protecting children and adolescents, and preventing teenage pregnancy in Peruvian communities. The project has been

It also helped strengthen local surveillance and care networks through the creation of six SIVICOS centres (community

monitoring centres for early detection in early childhood and pregnancy) and the use of new technologies to combat anaemia and chronic childhood malnutrition.

Two rooms with one-way mirrors were also set up, and judicial staff received specialised training to improve care for victims.

A communications campaign with more than 700,000 impressions helped reinforce awareness-raising efforts at the local level.

In 2021, the Honduran National Police violently entered her home and assaulted her physically and sexually. She has also been harassed on social media, and her brother and husband are facing legal proceedings. "No one is following

These conflicts are worsened by climate change, food insecurity, and deep inequalities in access to basic services. The impact of these crises is even more severe for children, adolescents, women, older people, and those with functional diversity. This makes it essential to deliver adapted responses that integrate their needs, aspirations, and priorities across all areas.

ched 52 initiatives to relieve suffering, ensure survival, protect fundamental rights, and uphold the dignity of 391,241 people (230,012 of them women and girls). We continued our response to the ongoing effects of conflict in Ukraine, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Yemen, Gaza, Sudan—the most severe humanitarian crisis in the world—and Syria, where we became a key emergency responder following the regime change at the end

> of the year. At the same time, we continued our work with internally displaced people, returnees, and refugees in Kenya, Uganda and Ethiopia.

This year also marked the consolidation of Farmamundi's presence in national and international humanitarian coordination forums. We deepened our work on the link between humanitarian action, development, and peace, while embedding environmental sustainability, gender, and protection across all programmes. We also committed to advancing the concept of humanitarian sovereignty, culminating in the development of the organisation's first Humanitarian Action Policy.

#### **ETHIOPIA: HEALING TRAUMA** AS A PATH TO **LASTING PEACE**

In northern Ethiopia, where conflict has left deep psychosocial wounds, local communities are

building lasting peace through mutual care and the defence of

mental health as a fundamental right. Together with partner organisations, the Ministry of Health developed and approved culturally adapted trauma therapy and mental health care manuals. These resources are now available in

Ten community women leaders have strengthened their skills in psychoeducation to support other women and to create safe spaces after experiences of sexual violence. Sixty-nine public health professionals also received specialised training in the treatment of post-traumatic stress. These actions recognise the power of local response, promote collective well-being, and place dignity at the heart of recovery.

We have rehabilitated safe spaces in Butembo, Vuhovi, and Beni where young people can access information and find support.

Thanks to the work of 30 young peer educators, 875 sessions on sexual health and

gender-based violence were delivered, reaching 21,174 adolescents (60% of them girls).

These youth leaders offer crucial support to those seeking trusted, peer-based guidance. We also promoted listening posts in health

centres, where nearly 2,000 young people (77% girls and 23% boys) have already received personalised care from social workers and counsellor nurses. A step forward towards a youth that is informed, protected, and empowered.

"At Khayr, we work tirelessly because everyone here needs us", says Ramez, a member of our partner NGO Khayr Ommah Association in Syria. In the Tal Sallour camp, where people have been displaced for over ten years,

winter worsens an already dire situation. The same is true in camps in Jindires and Idlib. "The tents are more than four years old and water leaks in over our heads".



The roads are impassable, making daily life even harder. "We've distributed blankets, mattresses, food, infant formula, and nappies, but there's an urgent need for heating and new tents". Despite everything, Ramez remains hopeful and continues his work: "I went back to university after 12 years in Aleppo, and I've planted flowers in the hope of bringing some beauty into this life and making it a little more pleasant. We care for them and water them every day".



 $2024 \text{ was a year of significant challenges and committed} \\ \text{responses. At Farmamundi, we reaffirmed our role as} \\$ a humanitarian organisation with agile and reliable logistics capacity, ready to act in both international emergencies and crises closer to home, such as the DANA weather event (cold drop) in November.

This year, we carried out 244 operations, delivering medicines and healthcare supplies to 35 countries. We shipped a total of 119 tonnes of supplies, responding to critical situations including the war in Ukraine, the severe health crisis facing people in Gaza, and, most notably, the emergency caused by the DANA in the Valencian Community. In this case, 21 affected municipalities received essential hygiene, cleaning, and


was activated.

In response to the DANA alone, we coordinated 56 shipments, amounting to 84 cubic metres and 57 pallets, valued at €81,418.80. We supplied medicines, medical products, and hygiene kits to Médicos del Mundo, as well as cleaning and protective materials. We supported 33 care homes and

protection supplies after our emergency protocol

partnered with volunteer pharmacists to ensure the safe use of medicines in the early stages of the emergency. We also coordinated the collection of damaged medicines in collaboration with the GVA and SIGRE and launched a

Major supply operations were also carried out in Syria, Yemen, Mali, Niger, Honduras, and Algeria. None of this would be possible without our specialised and deeply committed team. We are also grateful to the funding bodies that place their trust in our work and to the pharmaceutical laboratories that continue to donate vital supplies. Thank you for joining us and helping make responsible, effective, and humane humanitarian aid a reality.

#### **LIFE-CHANGING OPEN-HEART SURGERIES** IN MADAGASCAR

Four children received heart surgery for the first time in their own country, thanks to an initiative led by La Chaîne de l'Espoir in collaboration with Farmamundi. The surgeries

> were performed at CENHOSOA Hos-

pital in Antananarivo, in a fully renovated operating theatre. Not only was the initiative a medical success, but it also meant that the children and their families no longer

had to travel abroad to access life-saving treatment.

The project also included the delivery of essential medicines affected by supply shortages, along with logistical support to ensure they arrived on time. It also served as a valuable training opportunity for local healthcare professionals, helping to strengthen Madagascar's capacity to treat paediatric heart conditions safely and independently.











Medicine donations only have real impact when done responsibly. They must follow WHO guidelines: meeting specific needs, complying with quality standards, being properly labelled, and having a sufficient shelf life. It is equally important that they comply with the recipient country's regulations and include information in the appropriate language.

Thanks to the commitment of nine pharmaceutical laboratories, Farmamundi received 26,500 kg of medicines, medical supplies, and hygiene products to respond to a range of humanitarian emergencies. These dona-

tions were distributed to 16 social organisations across 13 countries, with a particular impact in care homes in Valencian municipalities affected by the DANA, health centres in the Gaza Strip, and

the Sumy region of Ukraine. Coordination with local heal-th authorities and partners is essential to avoid the arrival of unsuitable or unnecessary products. The ultimate goal? To protect public health.

"The need is extreme, and the barriers to getting aid in are enormous", explains Israa Mutair. In 2024, a complex humanitarian operation coordinated by the Mundubat Foundation (with funding from AECID and ELankidetza) and in collaboration with the WHO, the Egyptian Red Crescent, Farmamundi, and the HULO logistics platform, enabled the delivery of 9,500 kg of essential medicines to Gaza, after crossing multiple borders and checkpoints.

"Thanks to this donation, we were able to treat around 200 patients a day at our medical centres in Deir El Balah and Mawasi", she recounts. Many of the medicines had been unavailable for months. Despite logistical challenges and restricted access, Israa highlights the impact: "This aid has been essential. It has helped ease the brutal health crisis in Gaza. And it reminds us that we are not forgotten".



hrough our work in Education and Action for Social Transformation, we continue to champion the right to health, promoting and supporting processes of social change alongside a critical, engaged public that is aware of global inequalities.

To that end, we focus on recognising the power of citizens as agents of change. It's about taking action, positioning ourselves in our everyday lives like dominoes. As part of a broader chain reaction, our collective action, from the local to the global, can play a decisive role in advancing the right to health, the SDGs,

and gender equity.

In 2024, the department led 55 projects and programmes, reaching over 150,000 beneficiaries, participants, and collaborators. Among them were more than 60 educational communities involved in 18 projects across

> universities, vocational training centres, secondary schools, and primary schools.

A further 22 projects were carried out in collaboration with professional associations, grassroots organisations, and other non-formal settings, bringing together more than 110 participating and partner entities. It's also important to highlight that none of this would have been possible without the valuable and selfless contribution of our volunteers, who supported us throughout the year-even during challenging moments such as the DANA

emergency. To all our volunteers, collaborators,

and participants: cheers to your health!



In a world marked by health crises, inequality, war, and climate emergencies, the children and young people taking part in our projects

> have spoken up. They've done so from schools,

neighbourhoods, and youth centres, re-

flecting on mental health, diversity, and gender education, and creating campaigns, podcasts, research projects, and exhibitions rooted in rights and social justice.

Initiatives such as Vite ao ceo aberto (Galicia), SomosRural (Valencia), BÍledi (Andalusia), and La salud está en tu mano (Castilla-La Mancha) have built community through creativity, critical thinking, and social action. Investing in these generations means planting seeds for both the present and the future: they aren't just imagining another world, they're already building it, one action at

a time.



#### PHARMACIES DISPENSING EQUITY AND COMMUNITY HEALTH

What if pharmacies didn't just dispense medicines, but also solidarity and rights? In Aragón, more than 60 Pharmacy and Audiovisual Communication students, together with community pharmacy professionals, explored exactly that idea and made it a reality. Through workshops, debates, and creative

output, they reflected on pharmaceutical poverty, the social determinants of health, and the transformative potential of pharmacy practice.

The result was an exhibition, a podcast series, and other materials encouraging people to reimagine the pharmacy as a space

that's accessible, human, and committed to collective wellbeing and community health. These resources were showcased across the Colleges of Pharmacists in Zaragoza, Huesca, and Teruel. Because health can also be defended from behind the counter. And these pharmacies have already started doing just that.

At the 15th edition of the Premios para la Introducción de la perspectiva de género en la docencia y en la investigación (Awards for the Integration of the Gender Perspective in Teaching and Research), we were awarded first prize for the collaboration that Farmamundi and the University of Santiago de Compostela (USC) have been driving since 2017.



Lorena Añón, lead lecturer for the project, explains: "This award isn't for me as an individual. It's collective. It also belongs to Farmamundi, the Galicia team, and the women who've inspired me, like Ana and Bea from the Colectivo de Mujeres de Matagalpa. Thank you for your truly humane and professional work. This recognition drives us forward, but it also

reminds us that we need fair funding, funding that values our efforts and allows us to sustain them without personal cost. Because building a more humane, healthy, fair and more equal world cannot rely solely on individual commitment: it must be a real political commitment to the right to educate, to care and to bring about change without compromise".

n 2024, our organisation achieved several key milestones that reflect our ongoing commitment to excellence, sustainability and continuous improvement.

One of the most significant was the approval of the 2024-2027 Strategic Plan by the General Assembly. This plan was the result of a participatory process involving the entire organisation, strengthening an inclusive and transparent model of strategic planning. Its approval marks another step forward in the quality of our planning processes as a key tool for strategic management and ongoing improvement.


We also worked hard to obtain registration as a Socially Responsible Entity in the Comunitat Valenciana, an official recognition awarded in April 2025. This distinction underscores our dedication to the values of social responsibility, transparency and sustainability.

Farmamundi has further strengthened its focus on sustainability by integrating environmental, social and governance (ESG) criteria across all our activities. Together with our certifications (the Transparency and Good Governance Certification from the Coordinadora de ONGD and the ECHO certification) this positions Farmamundi as a benchmark organisation.

We have also driven forward digital transformation as a lever to improve operational efficiency, internal and external communication, and the quality of our services.

Continuous improvement remains a core pillar of our organisational culture. Through ongoing evaluation of our processes and outcomes, we aim to innovate, learn and adapt to meet the social and organisational challenges of today and tomorrow.





# RESILIENCE IN THE MIDDLE OF THE DANA

Javier Martí Gil, head pharmacist at a pharmacy in Paiporta and long-time Farmamundi collaborator, will never forget the days following the devastating DANA storm. The floodwaters didn't just sweep through homes, streets, and shops; they brought fear and uncertainty to an entire community. His own pharmacy was severely affected. In the midst of the chaos, Javier didn't hesitate to reopen on 7 November, just days after the disaster, to care for his neighbours, his patients, his community.

He recalls days marked by uncertainty, fear, helplessness, and urgent need, when "the pharmacy became a key hub of support and reassurance for many local residents". Farmamundi reached out to coordinate the delivery of medical supplies and support the emergency response in the town immediately after the storm hit.

The network of solidarity we built together—residents, institutions, healthcare professionals and organisations like Farmamundi—was a lifeline during the darkest days. In coordination with the local health authorities and the LASEMI team, priority was given to supplying essential medicines and tetanus vaccines to the
