"Farmamundi has consistently evolved, enhancing our professionalism and efficiency in resource management while delivering results and amplifying our impact. Our most notable achievement is improving health and access to medicine for 30 million people.

Our mission remains unchanged since day one: "To promote universal access to health through processes of sustainable social transformation"- In pursuit of this vital goal, we have managed over 160 million euros through 600 cooperation projects. We've responded to significant humanitarian crises around the globe, conducting 311 interventions and implementing 1,500 educational initiatives that have engaged over 680,000 individuals. Additionally, we have supplied 2,700 tonnes of medicines and health materials to more than 70 countries.

Partnerships with over 30 local partners

These accomplishments are the result of strategic alliances with Spanish NGOs and more than 30 local partner organisations in the countries where we operate. We also work with future generations (young people in primary and secondary schools, vocational training centres and universities across Spain) to cultivate critical thinking and raise awareness of global health inequalities, sharing our professional insights into these issues.

Today, the world grapples with significant humanitarian crises stemming from natural disasters that are intensified by climate change, coupled with armed conflicts driven by economic and geostrategic interests. These situations have led to tragic loss of life and alarming violations of international humanitarian law.



30 YEARS OF COOPERATION AND PARTNERSHIPS FOR HEALTH

In this turbulent and concerning environment, we have successfully intervened in seven of the 10 most severe humanitarian crises worldwide, as identified by the World Health Organization and the United Nations. 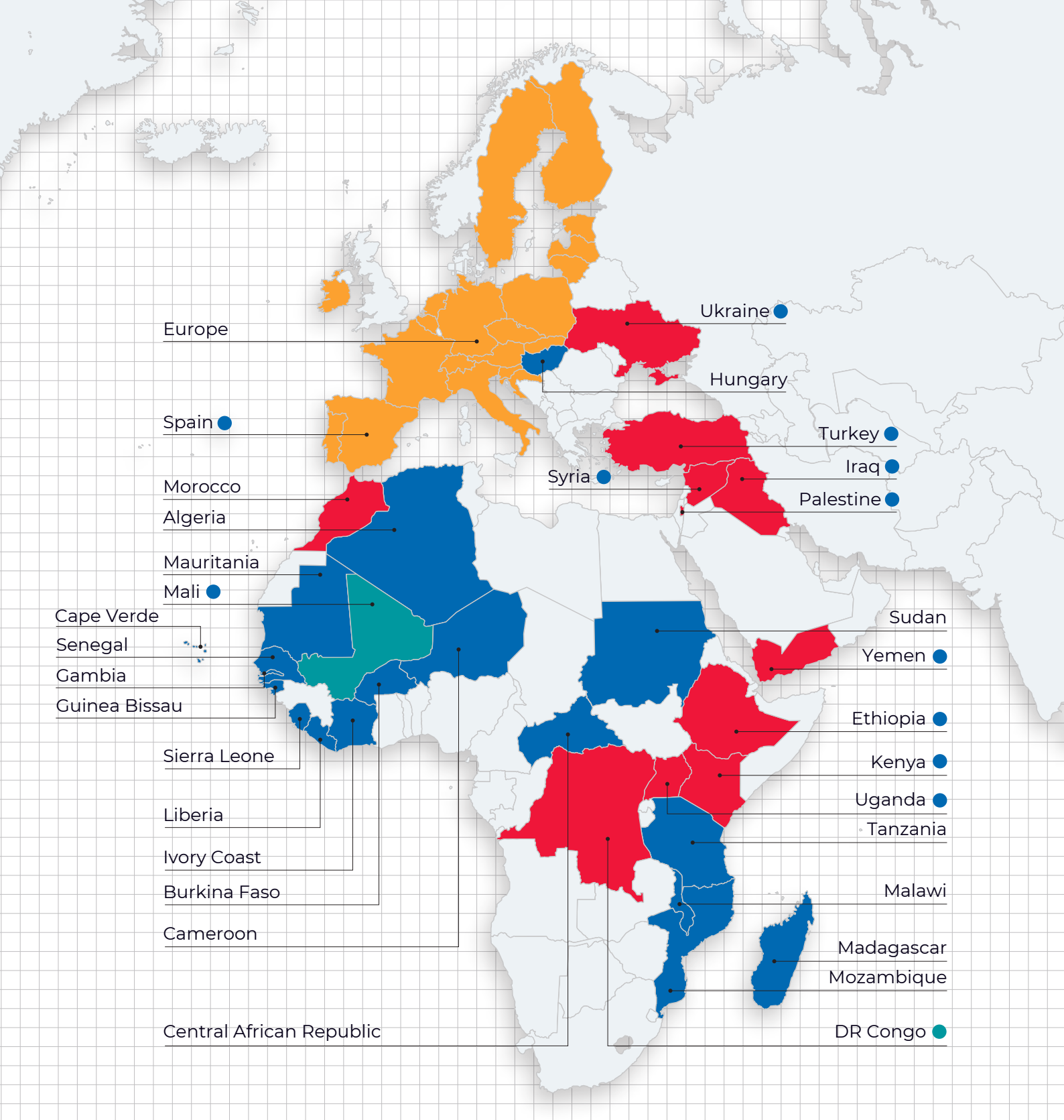

WE CALL FOR INCREASED COOPERATION AND THE GUARANTEE OF HUMANITARIAN AID IN THE GAZA STRIP

The year 2023 began with the approval of the Law on Cooperation for Sustainable Development and Global Solidarity, which received nearly unanimous support from parliamentary groups and significant social participation. This law aims to enhance the effectiveness, agility and transparency of Spanish cooperation in addressing new global challenges, with a commitment to allocate 0.7% of gross national income to official development aid by 2030.

This year has also been profoundly impacted by the unprecedented humanitarian crisis in Palestine. The escalation of war and the hindrance of international humanitarian aid to the Gaza Strip are unacceptable. We call for an immediate ceasefire to halt the senseless loss of life (over 35,000 fatalities by June 2024) and to respect international humanitarian law. Moreover, we are witnessing numerous humanitarian crises caused by armed conflicts and natural disasters, further widening the inequality gap. This is evident in regions like Syria, Yemen, Ukraine and the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), among many others where Farmamundi is present and actively working.

More cooperation for new global challenges

To meet these new global challenges, we rely on a capable team of 116 professionals, a social base of over 5,000 individuals, more than 100 volunteers, including our Board of Trustees, and 30 local partner organisations worldwide.

Together, we work diligently to improve the health of those who need it most.

This year, through 137 health initiatives and programmes in 20 countries, we have positively impacted the health of 775,189 individuals. In Uganda, Kenya and the DRC, 57,756 refugees and people affected by violence have received comprehensive health care. Additionally, 9,300 children from Ukraine, Morocco and Syria have accessed mental health and psychosocial support services.

Numerous humanitarian crises widen inequality gaps

In terms of providing essential medicines and health materials in emergencies and other health programmes, we have supplied 93 tonnes to 38 countries. Simultaneously, we have implemented 53 educational initiatives in Spain, engaging 148,884 participants in social transformation projects.

These initiatives and outcomes, detailed in this report, contribute significantly to enhancing the health of many individuals and are made possible by the generosity of our donors and supporters like you. Together, we share the firm belief that a better world is possible: a world that is fairer, healthier, supportive of solidarity, harmonious with nature and committed to peace.

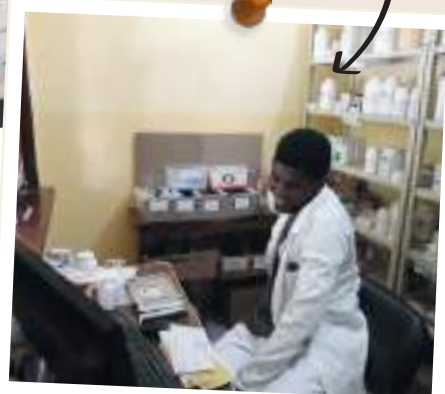
ECUADOR

MOZAMBIQUE

We have established a pharmacy at the Carmelo Hospital to enhance access to medicines. Thanks to the support from the COF of Madrid and our partners, the pharmacy has been equipped and stocked with essential medicines for its opening.



UKRAINE

In collaboration with Laboratorios Viñas, we prioritised mental health and psychological care for 7,720 individuals, supporting temporary accommodation centres and developing sports and leisure activities for young people and minors in Poltava.



SPAIN

We celebrated 30 years of cooperation at Infarma Barcelona! At Booth B20, we shared our efforts in responding to the Ukraine war emergency and the earthquake in Turkey and Syria, including a discussion on the importance of appropriate donations of medicines.



EL SALVADOR

Sara Valverde, the chair of Farmamundi, visited projects in La Libertad, Morazán and Usulután focused on preventing teenage pregnancy and violence against women, as well as pharmacovigilance and epidemiological prevention, alongside our local partners.



SPAIN

Additionally, more than 1,200 pharmacies have received the new solidarity pharmacy label. The label recognises their commitment to being responsible and trustworthy in campaigns that improve health access for many people.

UGANDA

In Kampala, we met with our local partners to exchange best practices in health care for women experiencing sexual violence in humanitarian crisis situations.



SPAIN

We are proud to announce that we received the Corresponsables Award for our work in Ukraine! We have supplied 110 tonnes of medicines to hospitals, distributed nutritional kits and basic necessities, and provided mental health care.



DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

Together with Cosalup and the General Council of Pharmaceutical Associations, we reinforced the medicine cabinets of the Social Distribution Network of Essential and Natural Medicines. We also provide psychosocial care to promote women's health.



MOROCCO

Following the earthquake that affected villages in the Taroudannt and Amzmiz regions, we prioritised delivering shelter, basic necessities, food and psychological assistance to over 6,500 people impacted by the disaster.



En our globalised world, the consequences of war, climate denialism and authoritarianism starkly reveal that these paths only lead to increased inequality and poverty, environmental destruction and a regression of democratic values.

Therefore, Farmamundi's cooperative actions serve as a means for individuals to exercise their rights, defend their civic space and build sustainable development alternatives. We also call on the international community, alongside our fellow organisations in the global solidarity movement, to commit effectively to peace, cooperation, gender equality and the conservation of shared natural resources.

Guided by these values, in 2023 we fulfilled our mission through 71 programmes and projects, contributing to restoring the rights of women facing violence, supporting women human rights defenders and strengthening public health systems,

particularly in the management, use and supply of medicines and primary health care. Our efforts have also focused on improving food and nutrition security, as well as access to clean water and sanitation for thousands in Latin America and Africa.

The results we've achieved are largely due to our partnerships with local organisations and the dedication of everyone involved in our association. Their commitment has earned the trust of institutions and entities, allowing us to continue channelling the aspirations of a citizenry that remains steadfast in making the Universal Declaration of Human Rights a reality.

Promoting women's rights in Mali

In the communes of Bendougouba and Badia in the Kita Region, we have partnered with the Association de Soutien aux Initiatives Communautaires and the Association Vestibule de l'Espoir (JIGIYA BLON) to support the sexual and reproductive rights of adult women, adolescents and girls. Our efforts have also focused on eradicating harmful traditional practices and protecting women in situations of violence.

With backing from the Andalusian Agency for International Development Cooperation, we have enhanced the sexual and reproductive health care at two primary health centres through improved infrastructure, adequate equipment and staff training.

Additionally, we have launched a communication campaign aimed at encouraging behavioural change, reaching over 29,000 people, and 25 women are currently participating in a training programme in advocacy and leadership to increase their representation in decision-making spaces.

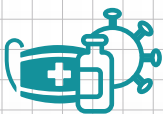

Pharmacovigilance and rational use of medicines in El Salvador

In collaboration with the Generalitat Valenciana and the Asociación Salvadoreña Promotora de la Salud (ASPS), this programme has enhanced the management, use and supply of medicines across 35 health units that address both communicable

and non-communicable diseases.

We have improved health care through five studies focusing on pharmacovigilance, evidence-based medicine, best practices and rational use of medicines for 500 health resources.

Infrastructure improvements include the expansion and enhancement of storage conditions in the Eastern

Health Region, remodelling seven warehouses and pharmacies and equipping 25 health centres.

Citizen participation for advocacy and social vigilance has been bolstered with the creation and integration of eight municipal committees in the micro-networks of Morazán, alongside communication and awareness campaigns that have reached 45,000 people.

We need communities where children live free of violence

"As a leader in my community, it has been crucial to learn how to identify the types of violence that occur, especially in the home. I collaborate with local and regional authorities on strategies to address violence and reduce gaps in access to services".



Luzmila Meléndez Torres, head of the Nuevo San Rafael Native Community in the central jungle of Peru, shares her experiences in a space of exchange with other members of the Defence Committees for the Rights of Children and Adolescents, established

over the last five years. This initiative is part of the For Our Rights agreement with the Flora Tristán Peruvian Women's Centre, the Centre for Development Studies and Promotion and AECID, involving 21,893 participants, of whom 12,605 are women.



PRIORITISING HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE IN PALESTINE AND SYRIA

In 2023, through our Humanitarian Action and Emergencies department and in coordination with local partner organisations, we implemented 66 actions aimed at alleviating suffering, ensuring subsistence, protecting fundamental rights and defending the dignity of 465,189 people, including 285,088 women and girls. We continued to respond to the effects of the war in Ukraine, Syria and Yemen, while also addressing the severe humanitarian and human rights crisis faced by the Palestinian population in the Gaza Strip, where more than 1.9 million Gazans have been forcibly displaced. Additionally, we responded to natural disasters in Turkey, Syria and Morocco, along with their humanitarian consequences.

Thanks to the support and trust of our partners, donor institutions and companies, we are committed to working with internally displaced persons, returnees and refugees in the Democratic Republic of Congo, Kenya, Uganda, Iraq and Ethiopia, focusing on improving the capacity to prevent and respond to critical public health situations. Our priority remains the prevention and protection of women who suffer sexual and gender-based violence in contexts marked by climate emergencies, deep economic crises and the collapse of state services, leading to famine, mass displacement and outbreaks of preventable diseases.

The approval of Law 1/2023 on Cooperation for Sustainable Development and Global Solidarity marks a significant challenge in the humanitarian sector, bringing high hopes for regulatory evolution and financial growth.

New health unit for young people in Kenya up and running

At the Kasarani Public Health Centre in Nairobi, we have established and commissioned a Youth Friendly Centre featuring three purpose-built rooms.



This space serves as a safe haven for young people to express their concerns, whether psycho-social or medical. It functions as a resource centre, providing timely and age-appropriate information, as well as a safe environment for survivors of sexual and gender-based violence, ensuring the privacy necessary for proper management and referral, including forensic testing for survivors.

The centre also offers sexual and reproductive health counselling services, including HIV testing, pregnancy testing, sexually transmitted infections treatment and contraceptive provision, as well as cancer detection and screening services.

Congolese displaced and refugee population at the centre of development

The humanitarian crisis in eastern DRC is deteriorating daily, forcing many to flee their homes for refuge in cities such as Beni and

Butembo or in neighbouring countries.

Over the past two years, we have implemented a strategy in DRC, Uganda, Kenya and the Basque Country aimed at enhancing the capacity to prevent and respond to the humanitarian health needs of displaced and refugee Congolese populations,

including survivors of sexual violence. This strategy encompasses local capacity building, empowerment of community structures and advocacy at both local and international levels.

This line of action has included the production of the documentary "Las que sobrevivimos" (What We Survive).

Emma was also a victim of sexual assault.

This opportunity has not only improved her economic stability but also strengthened her sense of dignity and security at home.

Like Emma, other women survivors of gender-based violence participate in small business training programmes in Kyaka II, becoming role models in their communities. They, in turn, offer guidance and support to other women facing similar circumstances.

Emma is a refugee woman in the Kyaka II settlement who recently lost her husband and cares for several children. Before coming to Uganda,



EMERGENCIES IN UKRAINE, SYRIA AND TURKEY FOCUS ON MEDICINE SUPPLIES

The humanitarian emergency caused by the ongoing war in Ukraine and the earthquakes in Syria and Turkey has driven the main supply efforts for medicines in 2023. The Humanitarian Logistics team has dispatched 92,848 kilograms of medicines and medical supplies across 301 shipments to 38 countries.

In Ukraine, with the help of donations from Fundación Juan Cañiñ, Valencia-based company DACSA and the Association of Pharmacists of A Coruña, we provided supplies to the Ivano-Frankivsk Children's Clinical Hospital and the Odessa Children's Hospital.

Start Hospital deployed in Iskenderun

Following the health emergency triggered by the earthquake in Turkey and northern Syria, we participated in establishing a Spanish Development Cooperation field hospital in Iskenderun, Hatay province, in Turkey.

As a specialised supplier, we dispatched 4,900 kg of essential medicines for surgical interventions, including analgesics, anaesthetics, systemic anti-infective drugs, anti-inflammatory drugs, dermatological drugs and treatments for respiratory conditions.

We also sent 20 Non-Communicable Disease (NCD) kits. Designed to serve around 10,000 people over three months, supporting patients with chronic conditions in emergency settings, this kits are used to treat everything from hypertension, heart and endocrine conditions to diabetes and chronic respiratory diseases.

The Humanitarian Logistics team has shared insights about our specialised work at various forums, including the Congress of the European Association of Faculties of Pharmacy, the International Pharmacy Congress in Barcelona, Infarma and the Master's Degree in Humanitarian Health Action at the University of Alcalá de Henares and the course on 'Pharmaceutical cooperation for development' organised by the Canary Islands Chair of Pharmacy of the Association of Pharmacists of Santa Cruz de Tenerife, among others.

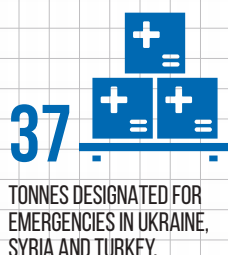
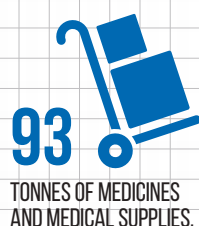

Provision of medicines to Mali with Médecins du Monde Belgique

As a Humanitarian Supply Centre for HPC medicines accredited by the Directorate General for Civil Protection and Humanitarian Aid (DG ECHO), we facilitated the provision of medicines to Médecins du Monde to support health centres in the health district of Gao and the Menaka region in northern Mali. This initiative aims to strengthen a medical-nutritional assistance project supported by USAID/BHA, ECHO and COPELUX, as well as health care and sexual and reproductive rights projects funded by DGD Belgium in the Kita region.

The humanitarian crisis in northern Mali, exacerbated by the presence of armed groups, has made Médecins du Monde's support crucial for sustaining health centre operations and reaching nomadic populations living more than 15 kilometres from community health centres through mobile clinics. Their projects prioritise pregnant women, internally displaced persons and children under five years of age.





Electrocardiographs and diagnostic tests for Ukraine

In collaboration with the International Medical Corps (IMC), we have supplied essential medicines and medical supplies, including electrocardiographs, diagnostic tests and scales to Ukraine.

The IMC team provides outpatient primary care, mental health and psychosocial support, gender-based violence



prevention and treatment and immunisation support. Since the beginning of the invasion, the organisation

has distributed over nine million non-food items, including hygiene kits and medical care.

"I'm thrilled to have participated in the launch of Start. It has been a truly enriching experience where we have been able to improve the health of many people. We have attended to 7,387 patients and supplied more than 74,000 units of medication, per active ingredient and single dose, as well as consumables and medical devices".

This is what the pharmacist from Granada, who managed the pharmacy at the Spanish Cooperation Hospital in Turkey, shared with us during her third rotation, following the return of Miriam López.

Vargas explained that *"the pharmacy played a vital role in supporting various departments, including outpatient care, hospitalisation, surgery, gynaecology, anaesthesia and psychiatry. The team also worked extensively in the*

The pharmacy has been the most cross-cutting service in the entire hospital



community, providing pharmaceutical care and monitoring patients with chronic conditions like hypertension, diabetes or cholesterol".

Both Miriam and Ana emphasised the role of pharmacists in collaborating with

the Turkish Ministry of Health on donations. *"Support was provided to health centres at both the primary and hospital care levels. Feminine hygiene products and supplies for children were also distributed in local settlements".*


More than 350 sources and health resources have been identified for the communities (assets for health), roundtables have been held with political and public administration representatives and a statewide campaign has reached over one million people.



Awards for student commitment and solidarity with global health

During 2023, both Josep Segrelles Secondary School in Albaida and San José Jesuitas Schools in Valencia were honoured for promoting global citizenship and solidarity through educational projects in collaboration with Farmamundi. The IES Josep Segrelles project received the prestigious 'Vicente Ferrer' National Award for Development Education, while Escuelas San José Jesuitas was recognised with the National Award for Learning and Service.

This is the perspective of Cristina Gómez Román, professor of the Master's Degree in Psychology at the University of Santiago de Compostela, on her involvement in the Farmamundi project 'Vite a ceo aberto.' As part of the initiative, students from the Master's programme designed and implemented

social intervention proposals aimed at a group of adolescents from the Vite neighbourhood.

"Both students and teachers gained so much from this experience. It allowed us to grow in numerous ways and step out of our comfort zones. We faced real-life situations

that we often explore theoretically but rarely get the chance to address outside the university environment. I believe the true aim of the university is to connect with society, and through these projects, we are able to do just that. That's why the word that best defines this project is: collaboration".

In 2023, as we marked our 30th anniversary, we have seen increased mission activity compared to the previous year, with a greater impact on the initiatives underway in the countries where we operate.

Public fundraising, which ensures the execution of projects in the coming years, stands at 76%, with our own resources at 22%, and donations accounting for 2%.

This year, we have also worked on the upcoming Strategic Plan 2024-2027, in which we remain committed to guaranteeing the economic sustainability of the organisation and maintaining a sound financial structure to continue fulfilling our social mission. The diversification of funding sources is essential to minimise risks and ensure the achievement of our mission objectives.

To this end, we continue to promote renewable energy, investing in solar panels, which will provide both economic benefits and contribute to climate sustainability.

Strategic commitment to quality

We continue implementing an integrated quality system within Farmamundi, aimed at continual improvement with a focus on results, impact and efficiency.

This system also helps us identify deviations from the annual plan and set goals, enabling corrective actions to be taken when necessary, ensuring the sustainability and quality of our interventions.

We are committed to transparency and accountability, with internal and external procedures endorsed by several organisations, including the AEMPS (Spanish Agency for Medicines and Health Products), ECHO (European Union Humanitarian Action), AECID (Spanish Agency for International Development Cooperation) and the State NGO Coordinator, whose transparency and good governance audit we successfully passed in 2023.

Farmamundi's accounts undergo an external audit every year, and more than 75% of our projects include intermediate and final audits, offering complete transparency to our supporters and donors. We thank them for their continued involvement in our joint mission for the right to health.

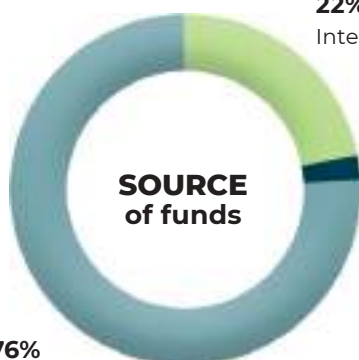
