Millions of people are seeing their most basic rights violated on a daily basis as a result of armed conflicts, forced displacement, protracted humanitarian crises and the growing impact of inequality. We must therefore remain steadfast in our commitment to upholding the universal right to health and supporting the most vulnerable populations, in order to protect and promote their rights.

The situation in Gaza represents the worst humanitarian emergency of our time. The intensification of the conflict and its devastating consequences for the civilian population have caused unacceptable suffering, with thousands of casualties, the destruction of essential infrastructure and severe restrictions on access to healthcare, medicines, drinking water and food. Farmamundi has supported international organisations and local bodies by supplying medicines, medical supplies and food, as a basic humanitarian response to civil society.

At the same time, the war in Ukraine continues to have a profound human and social impact. After four years of war, millions of people are internally displaced, homeless and facing severe difficulties in accessing food, medicines, heating and basic healthcare. Working alongside the Gender Bureau team, we continue to support displaced women with dependent children, older people and families at risk, by providing psychosocial support, legal advice and essential supplies.

We have also paid particular attention to the less visible crises in sub-Saharan Africa. Armed conflicts, inter-communal violence, political instability and the effects of climate change are causing mass population displacements in countries such as the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Uganda, South Sudan, Ethiopia, Mali and Kenya. Our work in these countries has involved supporting improvements in healthcare and mental health, strengthening community resilience and protecting the rights of displaced persons and refugees.

In this highly challenging global context, I would like to express my deepest gratitude to Farmamundi's members, donors, partner institutions and organisations, volunteers and professional staff for all your support. Thanks to your commitment, generosity and trust, we can continue to respond where needs are most urgent. Solidarity, cooperation and the defence of human dignity remain the guiding principles of our work. I encourage you to continue supporting us so that no one is left behind, and to help build fairer, healthier and more peaceful societies.

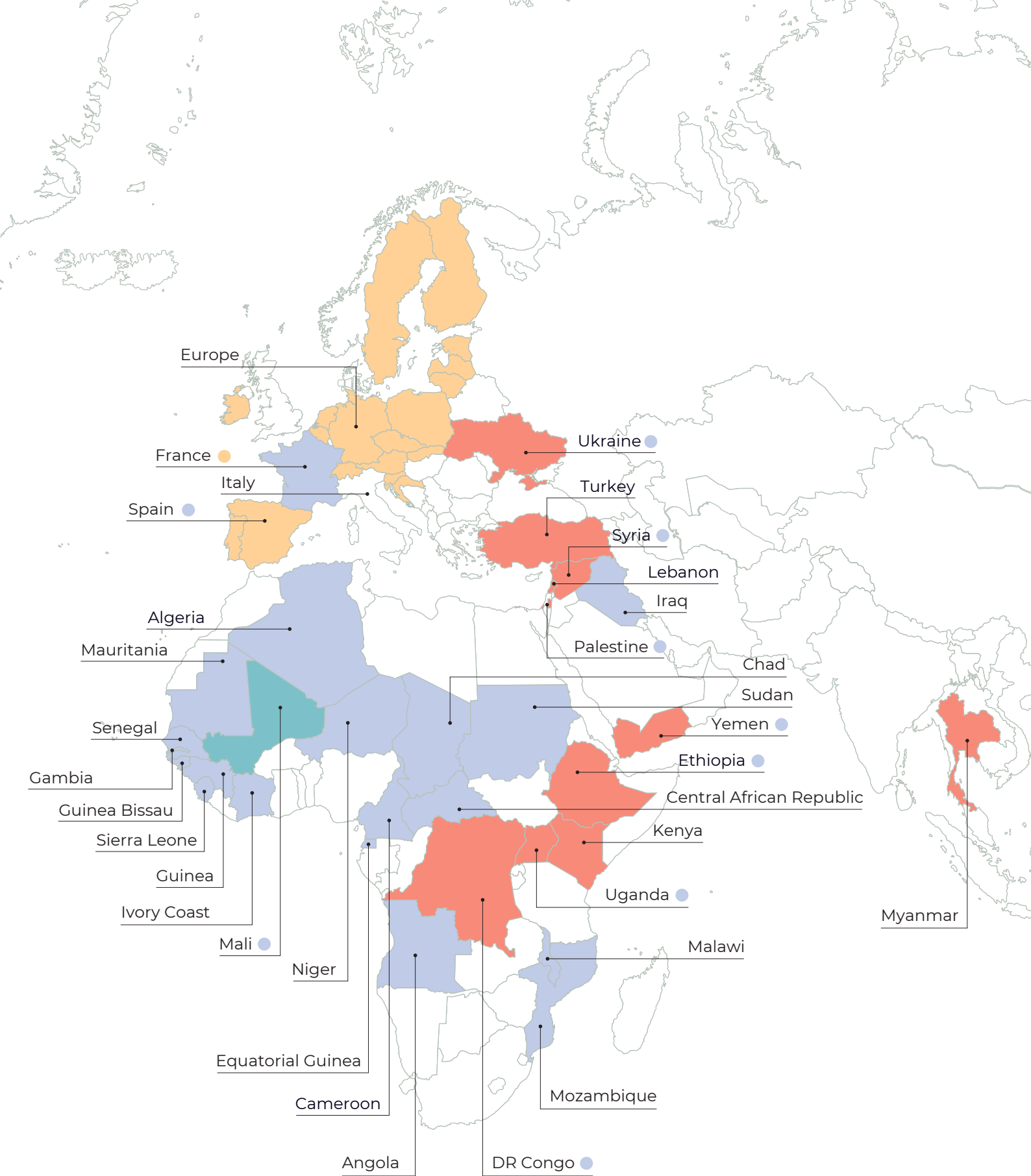

IN A WORLD OF INCREASING INEQUALITY, WE RESPOND THROUGH HEALTHCARE, COOPERATION AND SOCIAL TRANSFORMATION

This year has been marked by the global rise of authoritarian regimes, with a consequent erosion of democratic rights and freedoms, as well as an increase in international conflicts driven by economic and geostrategic factors. The result is greater inequality and poverty amongst peoples and across regions. We are seeing this in Ukraine, Gaza, Lebanon, Syria and the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

Farmamundi continues to work in partnership with local organisations to provide effective, sustainable and people-centred responses. This is reflected in the results achieved this financial year, during which nearly two million people have seen an improvement in their health and well-being through access to healthcare services, essential medicines, preventive measures, specialist care, educational programmes and community-building initiatives.

We have launched 188 health initiatives and programmes in 20 countries, tailored to a wide range of contexts, from humanitarian emergencies to long-term development processes. This has led to the strengthening of local health systems and improved care for particularly vulnerable groups, such as refugees, through approaches based on gender equality, environmental protection and human rights.

One of the cornerstones of our work continues to be access to essential medicines and healthcare supplies. This year, 32 countries received 122 tonnes of medicines and healthcare aid, which

has helped to strengthen the response capacity of health organisations and institutions in the face of crisis situations and structural health needs. Through our logistical and health cooperation efforts, we have managed to provide more than 150,000 medical treatments, notably through shipments to Yemen, Chad and DR Congo via the World Health Organisation's humanitarian airlift.

We believe in involving citizens in these initiatives and experiences with the goal of contributing to social transformation as an essential tool in building fairer, more informed and committed societies. In this regard, nearly 150,000 people have taken part in initiatives focusing on global citizenship education, awareness-raising, social mobilisation and advocacy, which promote a culture of solidarity and shared responsibility.

The above results are the realisation of a shared vision and a collaborative network that transcends borders. Each figure represents the people, communities and life opportunities that have been strengthened thanks to the joint efforts of our team, partner organisations, volunteers, public authorities, funding bodies and everyone who supports our work.

We continue to work with the same conviction and energy to address current and future challenges, strengthening our commitment to the right to health and social justice, in order to build a more equitable, sustainable and peaceful world.



PERU

We launched the podcast 'Un prospecto global', which explores inequality in access to medicines. It features more than 20 personal accounts and interviews with experts and is produced in collaboration with the journalist José Luis Lucas and the newspaper Las Provincias.



SPAIN

The PRENDE initiative was launched with the aim of building a system for the care and prevention of gender-based violence, led in partnership with Entrepueblos, DEMUS, Flora Tristán and AECID in Peru.

We provided training for community health workers and facilitated access to essential and natural medicines for 25,000 people in communities in Puerto Plata and Santo Domingo, in partnership with COSALUP and Spain's General Council of Pharmaceutical Associations.



SPAIN

At Infarma Barcelona, we reinforced our commitment to global health through a charity concert in support of healthcare provision for the people of Ukraine, and through a meeting with the Associations of Pharmacists to strengthen our cooperative partnerships.



DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

We organised a specialised training day on Female Genital Mutilation for healthcare and social care staff in the Valencian Community, in collaboration with Red Aminata and with the support of the Escola Valenciana d'Estudis per a la Salut.



ETHIOPIA

In partnership with WE-Action, we supported women, girls and families who have suffered violence, extreme poverty and a lack of access to basic services, providing psychological support, food, financial assistance and health education in the Amhara region.

MYANMAR

Following the earthquake in central Myanmar, we launched an emergency response providing medical care, psychosocial support, temporary shelter and cash assistance to over 3,000 affected people.

Photographer Sonia Reinoso organised the exhibition '40 Mujeres + de 40' (40 Women Over 40), a charity event aimed at connecting empowered women and professionals in Valencia. The money raised were donated to Farmamundi's social fund.

In the Gaza Strip, we expanded food assistance to people displaced by the war, who have lost their homes and are living without access to basic services such as healthcare and drinking water.

In rural areas of San Miguel Acatán, in Huehuetenango, family vegetable gardens have been set up which use agroecological practices, including native seeds, natural pesticides and organic fertilisers. The aim is to improve nutrition and health within local communities.

Thanks to 2,565 organisations, businesses and individual donors – including one thousand pharmacies – we were able to distribute more than 13 tonnes of medical and hygiene supplies in the wake of the DANA, as well as carrying out further initiatives, which we have summarised in a video.

We hosted a breakfast event with CE/R+S and Dr Ana Lluch entitled 'Health without borders: new business leadership in the face of global challenges', and reflected on how companies can exercise responsible leadership in the face of health challenges.



GREATER COOPERATION TO UPHOLD RIGHTS AND BUILD A FUTURE

The new global (dis)order, driven by elites who prioritise economic and military coercion over respect for international law, shows that the path of war, climate and scientific denialism, and authoritarian governance only leads to greater inequality, poverty, and democratic and social decline. This growing global instability threatens fundamental values such as justice, equality, peace, human dignity and solidarity. What's more, it jeopardises the 2030 Agenda and undermines international cooperation, despite the contribution of these to improving the lives of millions of men and women.

Given this situation, we continue to champion social justice and an international community that is committed to human rights, peace, dialogue and cooperation, and where people take the lead in their own development

This vision was the guiding principle behind our work throughout 2025, a year which saw us spearheading nearly 80 international cooperation initiatives. These initiatives have helped restore the rights of women facing violence, supported women human rights defenders, strengthened epidemiological surveillance and water quality monitoring, and improved primary healthcare services as well as food and nutritional security for thousands of people in Latin America and Africa.

We have achieved this thanks to our partners and allies in the North and the South, the commitment of our organisation and its professional team, and the support of institutions and donors who place their trust in us and continue to believe that peace and cooperation are the way forward.



SAFE WATER AND COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP IN COTOPAXI

Three initiatives in Cotopaxi, supported by the Regional Government of Navarre, the Regional Government of Cantabria and Zaragoza City Council, are improving health and reducing child malnutrition among 5,200 children in rural communities. Drinking water and sanitation systems are also being installed, benefiting more than 350 families through self-managed processes and with women taking the lead in water management.

A community-based health promotion model has been implemented to prevent infectious diseases linked to contaminated water and poor sanitation, bringing together the public sector and organised community groups. Furthermore, an environmental management plan is being drawn up through a participatory process to protect the catchment area and natural resources.

Finally, school-based education on health and the environment is being promoted among 1,282 children and adolescents, and 193 community leaders are being trained as health workers, thereby consolidating inclusive governance, social equity and respect for cultural diversity.

EPIDEMIOLOGICAL INTELLIGENCE UNITS STRENGTHENING THE HEALTH RESPONSE IN EL SALVADOR

The new Epidemiological Intelligence Units set up in Morazán and La Unión are strengthening public health response capacity in El Salvador. This programme, funded by the Regional Government of Valencia, has improved early risk detection, data analysis and decision-making

in the face of potential epidemic outbreaks, reaching 127,000 people.

The initiative emerged against a backdrop of poverty, limited access to healthcare and the recurring presence of diseases such as dengue, chikungunya, Zika

and COVID-19. In rural areas, women, children and older people in particular face greater risks due to a lack of medical staff and healthcare resources.

The programme has also strengthened the country's five health regions in the areas of prevention and epidemiological surveillance, incorporating community-based surveillance and the International Health Regulations. In addition, 54 health units have been upgraded, six infrastructure projects have been completed, and 26 centres and laboratories have been equipped. More inclusive care has also been promoted through training in sign language and initiatives related to gender equality.

“The awareness-raising sessions gave me the courage to take action”

Thanks to the support and awareness-raising sessions organised by IAMANEH-Mali – a partner organisation of Farmamundi which aims to uphold women's rights and sexual and reproductive health – Fatoumata was able to avoid a forced marriage and continue her studies in the Sabalibougou neighbourhood of Bamako.

Her mother, Mariam D., recalls that her daughter was only 15 when her husband's family decided to marry her off to an older man from the neighbourhood. “For them, it

was an opportunity to secure her future, but I knew it was far too soon,” she explains.

Mariam attended an event organised by the NGO almost by chance. There, she heard personal accounts concerning the consequences of early marriage on girls' health, education and lives. “The awareness-raising sessions gave me the courage to take action,” she says.

With the support of a counsellor from IAMANEH-Mali, she managed to talk to her husband and his family, despite the pressure and criticism. Eventually, they managed to have the marriage annulled.

Today, Fatoumata is still studying and dreams of becoming a nurse. Mariam now shares her experience with other women to encourage them to stand up for their children's rights.

THERE IS AN URGENT NEED TO STEP UP HUMANITARIAN ACTION IN THE FACE OF ESCALATING GLOBAL CRISES

Following decades of sustained growth, in 2025 the humanitarian system experienced the sharpest decline in funding on record: 34% less than in 2024, which was itself 10% lower than in 2023. The outlook for 2026 points to even greater cuts.

The lack of funding is having serious repercussions on access to vital medical services, particularly in fragile and conflict-affected contexts. Essential programmes for the prevention and treatment of malaria, the fight against HIV, tuberculosis and malnutrition, as well as sexual and reproductive health services, are being severely affected.

The current humanitarian crisis, a result of these unprecedented cuts, escalating conflicts and severe restrictions on access, is compounded by external factors that have been eroding the humanitarian system for almost a decade. The politicisation and weaponisation of aid, violence against humanitarian workers and the lack of security are preventing organisations from reaching the most affected populations, particularly in war zones. These constraints pose major challenges when it comes to responding to the scale of current needs.

Farmamundi has launched 58 initiatives aimed at alleviating suffering, ensuring livelihoods, protecting fundamental rights and upholding the dignity of 519,914 people (including 324,776 women and girls). We have thus continued our response to the effects of conflict in Ukraine, the DRC, Yemen, Gaza, Sudan, Haiti and Syria. At the same time, we have continued to work with internally displaced people, returnees and refugees in Kenya, Uganda and Ethiopia.

SYRIA: 35,164 PEOPLE RECEIVED HEALTHCARE IN THE MIDST OF A HUMANITARIAN CRISIS

In Syria, we continued to support displaced people who are living in extreme conditions. This is particularly true for women, girls and boys, who face enormous barriers to accessing healthcare.

In Jindires, we provided the free healthcare services at the Al-Muhamadyeh 1 centre with essential medicines and medical equipment, such as an ultrasound scanner and an X-ray machine. As a result, 35,164 medical consultations were carried out in just 11 months, more than half of which were for children. Furthermore, 77.8% of those received medical treatment.

We also ran health awareness campaigns for 1,200 people in camps for displaced people, focusing on mental health, women's health and the prevention of leishmaniasis. In addition, we set up a safe space to protect and support women and children facing violence and the impact of displacement.

CARE AND PROTECTION FOR THOSE WHO CONTINUE TO LIVE THROUGH THE WAR IN UKRAINE

After more than four years of war, millions of people in Ukraine continue to have their lives affected by displacement, fear and uncertainty. Many families have lost their homes and face severe difficulties in accessing food, medicines, heating and basic care.

Together with our partner organisation, Gender Bureau, we continued to support the most vulnerable people, particularly displaced women and families at



risk. 3,130 people received psychosocial support, legal advice and essential supplies thanks to mobile teams that reached remote and hard-to-access areas.

In addition, 3,000 families were able to meet their basic

needs through the distribution of food, medicines, hygiene products and aid vouchers. We also promoted safe spaces and training initiatives to support the protection, resilience and rights of those affected by the war.

From a young age, Maiga Bilqis felt the need to stand up for those around her. *"I always spoke up for my siblings when they were in trouble,"* she recalls. Years later, that little girl became a lawyer and legal assistant at Africa Humanitarian Action (AHA) in Uganda.

Today, she supports women who have survived sexual and gender-based violence on one of the most difficult journeys: reporting the abuse, regaining their confidence and feeling safe again. For Bilqis, justice goes far beyond a court case. *"True justice is when a woman feels respected again,"* she explains.

With empathy and a willingness to listen, she accompanies each woman in their journey from pain towards hope. *"Before introducing myself as a lawyer, I become*

their friend," she explains. Building on that trust, she helps the women regain their dignity. Because, as she herself says, her mission is to be *"the voice of those who cannot speak"*.

SPECIALISED HUMANITARIAN LOGISTICS: ACCESS TO MEDICINES IN THE MOST VULNERABLE CONTEXTS

In an international context characterised by wars, forced displacement, famines and increasingly strained health-care systems, ensuring the supply of essential medicines requires experience, technical expertise and highly specialised logistics. In 2025, Humanitarian Logistics carried out 199 shipments to 32 countries, providing medical treatments and healthcare products for thousands of vulnerable people in places where access to healthcare remains a matter of survival.

It has not been an easy year, which is why the way we have brought it to a close is so important. In a global environment marked by considerable uncertainty, we have managed to maintain stable operational capacity. This is because, instead of remaining inert, we have built a more robust structure, one that is less dependent on emergency peaks and more focused on sustained effort.

In 2025, we dispatched over eight million units of medicines and medical supplies. Behind this volume lies something even more significant:

nearly 150,000 complete treatment courses guaranteed, with a wider reach across the different contexts in which we work.

As well as preparing shipments, we advise and support organisations and institutions to ensure that aid reaches its destination with full guarantees of quality, traceability and safety. We work to rigorous technical standards and have a structure in place to respond promptly in complex contexts. Behind every consignment are people waiting for treatment and a chance to recover. That remains our goal: to help ensure that the right to healthcare and access to essential medicines do not depend on where one is born or the crisis one is facing.

A HUMANITARIAN AIRLIFT FOR HEALTHCARE TO YEMEN, CHAD AND D.R. CONGO

Farmamundi strengthened its humanitarian response capacity through HULO, a logistics platform launched by the WHO, and the European Union's humanitarian airlift, which enables the coordination and acceleration of aid shipments in hard-to-reach areas. Through this system, we carried out eight humanitarian operations and sent more than 43 tonnes of medicines, medical kits and therapeutic food to the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Yemen and Chad, via an entry point in Sudan.

The EU Humanitarian Air Bridge programme funds the logistics of these shipments, ensuring a safe, swift and efficient transport chain when conventional routes are not viable. These operations are based on international coordination, technical management and a common goal: to ensure healthcare and urgent aid reach populations affected by humanitarian crises.

“Every medical supply is a lifeline for people with albinism in Mozambique”

In Mozambique, people with albinism continue to face extremely difficult circumstances. Constant exposure to the sun, poverty and a lack of access to healthcare means that many have developed skin cancer and other serious illnesses.

“Many people live far from hospitals and cannot easily access medicines, check-ups or specialist treatments,” explains Justo García of África Directo.

Since 2020, this organisation has been working alongside the Centro das Mercês in Maputo to run dermatological campaigns, health education

and the distribution of sunscreen. The Mozalbinismo project is currently being rolled out across six provinces in the country in partnership with ISDIN and local hospitals. “We often receive urgent requests to purchase painkillers, morphine or even basic foodstuffs for hospitalised patients who do not have access to these resources,” says García.

“Our partnership with Farmamundi is key to ensuring the supply of medicines and medical equipment during our medical missions and to supporting the ongoing care of people with albinism,” he concludes.

MEDICAL, SHELTER AND HYGIENE KITS FOR THOUSANDS OF DISPLACED PEOPLE IN GOMA

The escalation of the armed conflict in the east of the Democratic Republic of the Congo has exacerbated an already extreme humanitarian crisis. Following the capture

of Goma by the M23 group in early 2025, hundreds of thousands of people were forced to flee their homes. The closure of the airport and the lack of security also

hampered the delivery of urgent aid.

Despite the difficulty, and in partnership with DanChurchAid and with the support of the European Union's Humanitarian Air Bridge, Farmamundi organised the delivery of 8,562 kg of humanitarian aid to Goma. The shipment included shelter kits, medical supplies and menstrual hygiene and dignity products, intended primarily for displaced people and host communities.

The operation made it possible to maintain aid during an emergency characterised by enormous logistical difficulties, ensuring basic support for thousands of people affected by the violence in the country.

PROMOTING HEALTH MEANS EDUCATING, PROTECTING AND NURTURING CITIZENSHIP

Health is not a matter solely for hospitals, pharmacies or health centres. It is also protected – or undermined – by collective decisions, public policies, our relationship with the environment, and a society's ability to plan ahead, look after itself and care for others. Recent challenges have made this clear: a pandemic that brought the world to a standstill, increasingly frequent extreme weather events, and silent threats such as antimicrobial resistance, with global consequences that are also felt in our own communities.

Our Education and Action for Social Transformation Department works at the intersection of the global and the local. We know that it is not enough simply to react when a crisis erupts or when problems affect us directly; rather, we need to build a critical, informed and engaged citizenry, capable of understanding the root causes of these challenges and of linking health to human rights, gender equality, social determinants and environmental sustainability.

To this end, in 2025 we launched 50 educational, community and social mobilisation initiatives in partnership with educational communities,

healthcare professionals and pharmacists, volunteers and a diverse range of citizens. These initiatives have created spaces for learning, reflection and collective action, reinforcing Farmamundi's commitment to the universal right to health.

What's more, these initiatives have enabled us to expand networks, strengthen partnerships and mobilise thousands of people around a shared conviction: that health is a common good and that safeguarding it requires active communities, accountable institutions and a citizenry capable of acting in a spirit of solidarity and global shared responsibility.

TATU LOTURA: MIGRANT WOMEN FOR HEALTHCARE WITHOUT BARRIERS

As part of the Tatu Lotura initiative, we carried out a process of research, awareness-raising and advocacy aimed at highlighting the barriers to accessing the right to health faced by migrant women from East Africa in the Basque Country. The initiative was funded by the Basque Agency for Cooperation and based on the approach of the Triple Nexus – humanitarian action, development and peacebuilding. It involved connecting these women's experiences with those of healthcare professionals through the creation of safe spaces for dialogue. In these spaces, participants played a leading role in generating knowledge and proposing solutions.

Through participatory methodologies such as Human Libraries, more than 400 people engaged in dialogue about these life experiences, fostering empathy, critical awareness and a culture of peace based on recognition, dignity and the universal right to health.

ACTIVATING THE SDGs: LOCAL CITIZENS TACKLING GLOBAL CHALLENGES

The 'Activating the SDGs' programme brings together three years of participatory initiatives that link the Sustainable Development Goals with national challenges relating to health, equity and sustainability, as the 2030 Agenda marks its tenth anniversary. Using asset-based community health approaches and social innovation, more than 500 students, practitioners and social organisations from eleven of Spain's autonomous communities reflected on how major global challenges manifest themselves in their local areas



and co-created citizen-led responses to tackle them. These processes enabled participants to identify community assets, strengthen local networks and develop pilot initiatives capable of contributing, at a local level, to the

achievement of the goals in the coming years. 'Activating the SDGs' demonstrates that the 2030 Agenda can be advanced when participation, shared responsibility and an active global citizenry are encouraged.

In 2025, Farmamundi continued to strengthen its responsible and transparent management, focused on maximising the social impact of every euro received. Thanks to the commitment of public institutions, partner companies and, in particular, the thousands of members and donors who trust in our work, we have been able to sustain our response to some of the world's greatest humanitarian and development challenges.

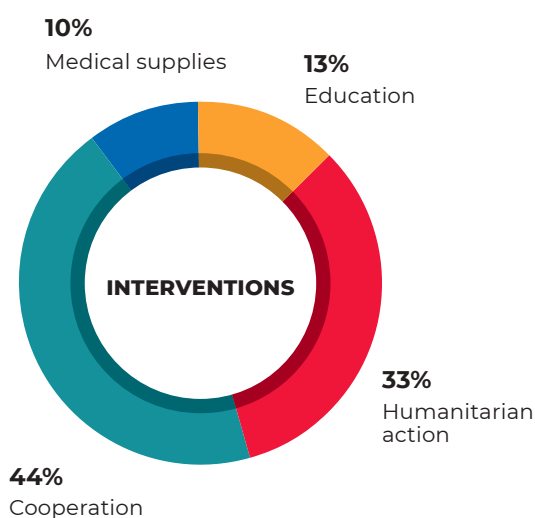
During the financial year, we administered a total of 16.98 million euros, of which 88% was allocated directly to our mission: improving access to healthcare, protecting rights and responding to humanitarian crises.

Only 2.5% was spent on administrative costs and 9.5% on fundraising, reflecting efficient management and a commitment to the effective use of our resources. Furthermore, 78% of our funding came from agreements and grants, supplemented by our own resources and contributions from individuals and organisations who are committed to our mission.

At the same time, we continued to drive the organisation's digital transformation through the implementation of a new integrated management system, improving efficiency, traceability and the quality of information. This process represents a significant step forward in the modernisation of our systems. It enables us to work more effectively and increase the impact of our interventions, by focusing on value-adding processes and minimising administrative and automatable tasks.

Furthermore, the Regional Government of Valencia has renewed its recognition of Farmamundi as a socially responsible organisation, endorsing our commitment to ethical, sustainable management focused on continuous improvement. The financial report and audited accounts can be viewed in the Transparency section of our website.

Overall, the progress made in 2025 reflects an organisation that is stronger, more efficient and better prepared to tackle future challenges, with a commitment to continuous improvement in order to expand its social impact.

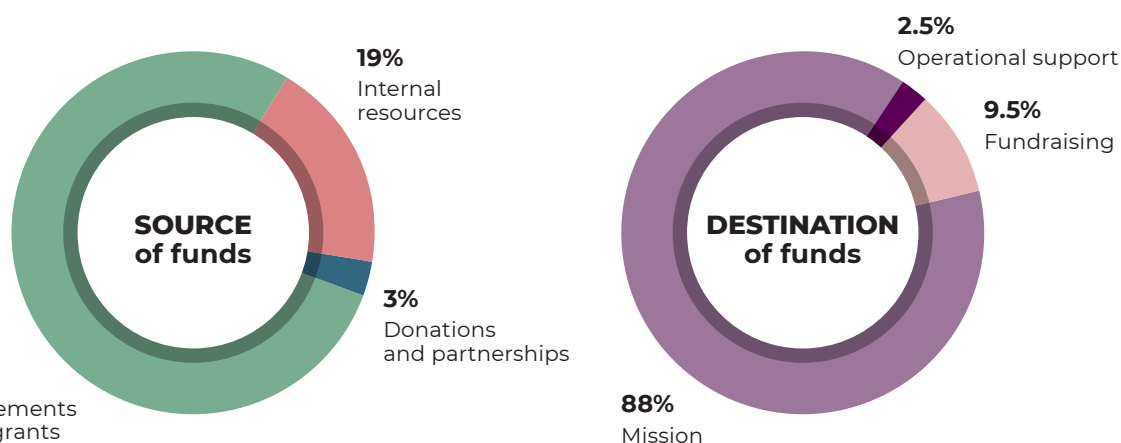

Unifarco has used its face-to-face training sessions to create a series of solidarity events with a real impact. Working alongside Farmamundi, it organised 46 events in 28 Spanish cities and succeeded in mobilising more than 1,400 pharmacists, allocating 100% of the registration fees to humanitarian projects that provide access to healthcare and essential medicines.

Over €14,000 was donated to Farmamundi's social fund, demonstrating
